### 1. WELCOME

Dame Margaret Bazley welcomed members and visitors to the Canterbury Mayoral Forum (CMF) meeting.

Apologies were received from Chief Executives Peter Nixon and Michael Ross.

### 2. CONFIRMATION OF AGENDA

No items of general business were identified.

### 3. MINUTES OF CANTERBURY MAYORAL FORUM MEETING: 4 December 2015

The minutes of the meeting held on 4 December 2015 were confirmed and the action points received.

### 4. DISCUSSION WITH CONSUL-GENERAL JIN ZHIJIAN, PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA

Dame Margaret Bazley welcomed Jin Zhijian, Consul-General, and Liu Lian, Consul, People's Republic of China, to the meeting.

Consul-General Jin thanked Dame Margaret for inviting him to the meeting and said it was good to meet the Mayors, who he has met individually, together. He spoke on two subjects; tourism and investment.

Consul-General Jin made the following points about tourism:

- The success of the direct flights into Christchurch from China, with booking rates of 80% up to April, and the potential for this to become a daily service.
- The increase in the number of Chinese visitors, particularly during the Spring Festival.
- New Zealand is now in the top 10 travel destinations for people from China, and with unrest in other parts of the world, New Zealand will become more popular.
- There is great potential for tourism but there are some matters that need to be addressed:
  - A lack of suitable hotel accommodation, particularly in the peak season (Spring Festival)
  - More promotion of attractions in Canterbury New Zealand is already well known.
  - Provide signs in Chinese at the airport and other places to make people feel welcome.
  - Chinese people speak English but they find it difficult to converse. It would be valuable for local people in the service industry to learn Chinese, especially young people. The Consul and the Confucius Institute can assist with teachers and text books.

Investment:

- China last year invested \$US100 billion globally and this will continue. \$US1.9 of this was in New Zealand.
- Chinese investors recognise the importance of New Zealand and although the economy has slowed, Chinese companies offer value-added products and are more willing to make investments overseas.
- New Zealand is seen as peaceful and friendly, with a good legal system.
- The rebuild of Christchurch has attracted the attention of Chinese companies, but the difficulty is identifying the right projects.
- The matter of the South Island having small projects could be addressed by developing a package for a hotel development, for example 2 hotels in Christchurch, one in Kaikōura and one at Lake Tekapo. However, there is concern about occupancy rates during the low season.
- There is also interest in irrigation.

The work that goes into building relationships was acknowledged, noting the success of Christchurch International Airport in securing the China Southern Airlines link to Christchurch, as the international gateway to Canterbury and the South Island.

Tom Hooper stressed the importance of being proactive in obtaining investment. Councils can assist by pre-consenting sites for hotel developments, which will reduce delay and risk for investors.

The role Mayors play in making Chinese investors feel welcome is important, in addition to providing accurate information and links to the right channels.

Mayor Lianne Dalziel explained that Develop Christchurch Ltd has been established to provide a front-face focus for investors to connect with developments.

Mayor Winton Dalley added that attractions need to be included with investment options and would help address the low-season concerns.

Dame Margaret Bazley thanked Consul-General for his presentation, and that the Mayoral Forum looks forward to the continuing relationship.

Consul-General Jin Zhijian and Consul Liu Lian left at 9.45 am.

The following Action Points were identified:

- A template to assist each Council identify suitable sites in their area for hotel developments. The template would include a description of the site: dimensions/capacity/planning situation, as well as demographics and opportunities.
- The Forum to write to the Prime Minister expressing concern at the lack of urgency on decisions for the Christchurch Rebuild projects including the convention centre and the events centre. This delay is affecting investor decisions on accommodation and other private investment in the city and the region.
- Continue to identify priorities and action (Visitor Strategy), and continue discussions with Minister Joyce about the need for urgency with respect to infrastructure for visitors.
- Continue to investigate opportunities for special economic zones.

### 5. LOCAL GOVERNMENT COLLABORTION IN CANTERBURY

Jim Palmer and Bill Bayfield presented the report on page 11 of the agenda and confirmed that Janie Annear, Local Government Commissioner, and the Minister of Local Government, Hon Peseta Sam-Lotu-liga, will be attending the Forum meeting to be held on Friday 29 April.

Mayor David Ayers advised that the Department of Internal Affairs was looking at benchmarking local government performance and will be holding road shows in March.

Dame Margaret Bazley suggested that it would be useful to list all the things that the councils are collaborating on, for example the health and safety forum.

The following recommendation was supported:

That the Canterbury Mayoral Forum:

- 1. Notes that conversations are scheduled for Friday 29 April 2016 with the Local Government Commission (LGC) and with the Minister of Local Government on Canterbury's approach to more effective government.
- 2. Agrees to prepare for these conversations during the Mayoral Forum's working dinner on Thursday 28 April 2016.
- 3. Notes central government's direction of travel in relation to local government reform and the LGC, as outlined in this report.
- 4. Endorses the proposal of the Chief Executive Forum to contract Peter Winder to provide an independent review of it progress on collaboration and shared services against his August 2013 report to the Mayoral Forum on "Options for broader collaboration between Canterbury councils".
- 5. Endorses a working group on Chief Executives exploring further opportunities for collaboration, including structural and institutional arrangements through which Canterbury councils might more effectively govern and manage the delivery of services, infrastructure and regulatory functions across our region.

### 6. CANTERBURY REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY

### 6.1 Canterbury Digital Strategy

Mayor Damon Odey spoke to his report on page 24 of the agenda that included an update on the Canterbury Digital Leadership Forum.

### 6.2 Canterbury Visitor Strategy

Winston Gray spoke to his report on page 25 of the agenda. He also raised the issue of freedom camping. The current legislation, introduced for the rugby world cup, creates some difficulties for councils, unable to enforce bylaws on land not owned by the council.

The following Action Points were identified:

- Collate what Christchurch City and other councils have done in response to freedom camping, to support lobbying central government for a change to the legislation.
- The issue of bulk purchase and installation of solar charging tables in selected Canterbury towns be placed on the agenda for the next CEO Forum.
- Create a map of all free Wi-Fi spots in Canterbury.

The meeting adjourned between 10.58 and 11.15 am.

### Value Added Production

Mayor Craig Rowley advised that an update on the value-added production work would be provided at the next meeting. The main point is that the Forum needs to reinforce with central government how crucial irrigation is to Canterbury.

Dame Margaret Bazley explained that Environment Canterbury has been making representations to the government regarding water storage and adequate funding.

### 6.3 Case for Canterbury

Jim Palmer spoke to his report on page 26 and the recommendation to pursue external funding for a usage, attitude and image survey to inform the development of a campaign to attract people to the region.

The following Action Points were identified:

- There was some support in principle for the survey, but it was agreed to defer this proposal to allow Mayors to take this back to their councils for further consideration. CEOs will then bring comments back from their councils to the next CEO forum.
- It was also agreed to invite Malcolm Johns to a meeting so he can explain the value of the survey.

### 6.4 Review of regulatory barriers

Jim Palmer spoke to his report on page 28 of the agenda.

### 6.5 Correspondence with Ministers

The Ministers' correspondence pages 29 to 38 of the agenda was noted.

The following recommendations were supported:

That the Canterbury Mayoral Forum:

## 1. Receives the Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy (CREDS) **Digital connectivity**

- 2. Adopts the Canterbury Digital Strategy 2016 and publishes this on the regional council website as a companion strategy to the Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy
- 3. Supports the initiative to invite a closer relationship ('a Canterbury Digital Accord') between the Canterbury Mayoral Forum and Crown Fibre Holdings Ltd, to achieve the CREDS objective of 'a fully connected Canterbury".

### Visitor Strategy

- 4. Notes progress on developing a Canterbury Visitor Strategy
- 5. invites Mayor Winston Gray to circulate a final draft once consultation is complete, for 'round-robin' approval and publication.

### Case for Canterbury

6. Refer to each council the proposal for a usage, attitude and image survey to inform development of a campaign to attract people to the region.

### Review of regulatory barriers

David Bromell was thanked for his work on the development of the Canterbury Digital Strategy and the Canterbury Visitor Strategy.

### 7. CHIEF EXECUTIVES FORUM REPORT AND THREE-YEAR WORK PROGRAMME

Jim Palmer presented the report from the Chief Executives' Forum and the three-year work programme, for information. He confirmed that a budget for the Mayoral Forum Secretariat had been included in Environment Canterbury's draft annual plan.

### 8. CWMS QUARTERLY REPORT

Commissioner David Caygill was welcomed to the meeting and he spoke to the report on page 113 of the agenda.

He highlighted two aspects of the report:

- The usefulness of the Zone Committees' Annual Reports.
- Plan Change 5 to the Canterbury Land and Water Management Plan which revised the regional-level approach to farm nutrient management. The changes to the rules places limits on nutrient loss related to good management practice. This is the outcome of 3 years working with industry groups to get agreement on a narrative description. The Scientists have developed a methodology to change the OVERSEER model. Submissions close on 11 March.

Responding to comments that there needs to be a better understanding of good management, Commissioner Caygill undertook to circulate a booklet on good management practice.

Regarding the Plan Change the OVERSEER portal, Mayor Winton Dalley expressed disappointment that the Plan Change did not cover criteria for permitted activities.

### 9. GENERAL BUSINESS

Mayor Damon Odey reported on a free app, Snap Send Solve that allows people to easily report feedback to their Council. It is being used by Christchurch City and Timaru District is currently trialling it.

Mayor Lianne Dalziel confirmed that the app was useful, but they were working on further development to enable a final response to be provided after action has been taken.

## **Chief Executives Forum report**

### Purpose

1 This paper reports on the work of the Chief Executives Forum and Canterbury Policy Forum, and updates the three-year work programme.

### Recommendations

That the Canterbury Mayoral Forum:

- 1 **receive** the report
- 2 **note** the updated status of items on the three-year work programme
- 3 **note** that a paper will be presented to the Mayoral Forum on 24 June 2016 on the future of the Canterbury Economic Development Company Limited.

### Chief Executives Forum

2 The Forum met on 4 April 2016. Key items from the agenda are outlined below.

### Presentation from Andrea Reeves, Office of the Auditor-General

- 3 The Forum received a presentation from Andrea Reeves of the Office of the Auditor-General. Andrea's presentation focused on recent work of interest to local government, in particular work on long-term plans. Key points were:
  - the integration of infrastructure and financial strategies in Waimakariri's 2015 longterm plan was a stand-out from the Canterbury region
  - the introduction of infrastructure strategies is a positive change local authorities need to focus on financial sustainability as they address changing demographics (i.e. the ageing population)
  - plans are showing renewals to depreciation ratios of less than 100% and actual capital expenditure that is substantially under budget, indicating a need for better information about the condition of assets, and greater accuracy in setting budgets
  - for the 2018-28 long-term plans, infrastructure and financial strategies should be ready by July 2017, to allow time for consultation
  - in 2016/17 the Office will look at how local authorities are investing to improve their understanding of their assets.

### Christchurch City Council

- 4 Teresa Wooding and Rebecca Doubleday presented on the Christchurch City Council's Infrastructure Project. This project is focused on investigating current challenges in the delivery of water and transport, to optimise service delivery and value.
- 5 A strategic assessment has been completed, with next steps depending on whether there is regional or sub-regional interest in broadening the strategic assessment to understand if a regional or sub-regional case for change exists.
- 6 Christchurch City Council has offered to broaden its strategic assessment of 3 Waters and transport infrastructure and to work with other Canterbury councils to identify opportunities for collaboration on a regional or sub-regional basis.

### Review of collaboration and shared services

7 The Chief Executives Forum discussed Peter Winder's draft report *Collaboration between Canterbury Local Authorities – progress and opportunities.* 

### **Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy**

- 8 The Forum discussed the purchase and installation of solar charging tables, the proposal to identify potential hotel sites and consent requirements, and work on freedom camping.
- 9 Members were asked to contact Angela Oosthuizen if they are interested in taking part in the bulk purchase of solar charging tables, though it was noted that this initiative would need to be balanced against other spending priorities. Chief Executives noted that this might be a suitable project for service clubs to consider.
- 10 Members were asked to contact Wayne Barnett if they have suitable sites for hotel development.

### **Canterbury Maps**

11 Canterbury Maps is progressing work on identifying free WiFi sites around the Canterbury region. The Forum supported promoting this information through Canterbury Maps, Christchurch & Canterbury Tourism, and district tourism offices.

### **Canterbury Policy Forum**

- 12 David Ward (acting chair) reported to the Chief Executives Forum on the work of the Policy Forum, which met on 18 March 2016. Key items were:
  - an update on actions in progress under the Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy
  - a discussion via teleconference on opportunities for regional collaboration, following on from the teleconference earlier in the day with Chief Executives and Dame Margaret Bazley
  - an update on processes for providing shared submissions on central government initiatives and new legislation, and a revised timeline from the Ministry for the Environment on the National Direction projects a shared Canterbury region submission has been made on the Resource Legislation Amendment Bill

- formation of a working group to support a consistent approach to requests for official information
- freedom camping in Canterbury
- an update on each council's community engagement for Annual Plans
- opportunities for shared training and professional development.

### Other matters

13 Other reports and updates were received as follows:

- approval of Terms of Reference for the Canterbury Engineering Managers Group
- update on rating and valuation services
- update on public transport governance in Greater Christchurch
- health and safety update.
- 14 The directors of Canterbury Economic Development Company Limited met on 31 March 2014. The primary item for discussion was the future of the Company and whether there was a purpose for it as it has been dormant for a number of years. The directors will bring back to the next Mayoral Forum a paper which covers the Company's purpose and the possibility of future benefits if it is maintained. From this the directors will seek direction from the Mayoral Forum regarding the Company's future.

## Canterbury Water Management Strategy update

### Purpose

This paper updates the Canterbury Mayoral Forum on the Canterbury Water Management Strategy (CWMS).

### Recommendations

That the Canterbury Mayoral Forum:

1 **note** the progress report on the CWMS.

### **Progress report**

### **CWMS Zone and Regional Committees**

- 1 All committees have approved an annual report to the community. These are being presented to Councils and to Ngāi Tahu Rūnanga through to May.
- 2 Andy Pearce has been reappointed as the Independent Chair of the CWMS Regional Committee through to December 2017.
- 3 There will be a refresh of the community members of the Regional Committee in August.

### CWMS 2020 targets

4 Environment Canterbury is reviewing the measures and indicators for reporting the 2020 and 2040 targets. This does not include a review of the CWMS targets themselves. The next biennial report on the CWMS targets is due in 2017. A report recommending a set of measures/indicators will be presented to the CWMS Regional Committee and the Canterbury Mayoral Forum.

### Infrastructure

### Hurunui-Waiau

- 5 The Hurunui Water Project (HWP) has been granted an additional \$520,000 through the Irrigation Acceleration Fund (IAF). HWP is now carrying out an 'Initial Steps Programme' to refine project layout and re-engage with landowners and shareholders. A successful outcome of this work will enable access to \$3.3M in a reserved IAF grant which requires local matching funds to support a full Stage 1 feasibility work programme.
- 6 The Zone Committee continues to encourage the three major entities with an interest in irrigation: HWP, Amuri Irrigation Co. and Ngāi Tahu Farming, to develop a combined infrastructure concept.

### Waimakariri

7 A large scale water storage proposal for the Waimakariri zone is on hold until final funding is confirmed for feasibility investigations. Consents for Waimakariri Irrigation Ltd to build on-scheme storage are still in Environment Court processes.

### Selwyn Waihora

8 Design plans for Stages 2 and 3 of Central Plains Water (CPW) are proceeding. Stage 1 construction is complete and planning for Stage 2+ (includes the Sheffield area) is underway with a capital call expected in the first half of 2016. CPW has been granted a nutrient discharge consent consistent with the new Selwyn Waihora plan requirements.

### Ashburton

- 9 The Rangitata Diversion Race is progressing a proposal to store water beside its main race near the Rangitata River, with consent lodgement expected in mid-2016.
- 10 Barrhill Chertsey and Rangitata Diversion Race have both appealed the Hinds decision.
- 11 Construction has begun on the Managed Aquifer Recharge pilot in the Hinds area. The project has received funding from the IAF (\$312,000), Environment Canterbury, and local irrigation/community interests. The six-week pilot project will be commissioned on 3 June 2016.

### South Canterbury

- 12 The Rangitata South Irrigation Scheme is continuing with sealing of storage and distribution. Waihao Downs Irrigation is operational. Hunter Downs Irrigation continues to refine their scheme design to balance affordability and environmental objectives.
- 13 Environment Canterbury, the CWMS Regional Committee and the three south Canterbury zone committees continue to advance an integrated 'southern Infrastructure' approach. An IAF water resource modelling study and supporting demand study will be completed by June 2016. The work also includes mid Canterbury parties and will assess options such as bringing currently consented Rangitata Diversion Race water into south Canterbury. Potential improvements to Opuha scheme infrastructure and practices are being considered for the 'in-zone' scenario.
- 14 The work in South Canterbury will by June have advanced to a stage where various integrated infrastructure concepts bringing water from the south, north and/or west can be assessed for their ability to deliver on all CWMS targets. The work will dovetail into the process of setting environmental limits of the Orari-Temuka-Opihi-Pareora Zone. The next step is to determine the mandate, entities and processes for advancing discussions and determining what infrastructure is best for South Canterbury as a whole.
- 15 A recent capital call by Hunter Downs had sufficient uptake to progress to the next stage of investigations. Closer alignment with the Morven Glenavy Ikawai Scheme is emerging and a new advisory panel has been formed to consider Wainono augmentation options involving both schemes.

### **Regional planning**

16 The Canterbury Regional Policy Statement has strong references to the CWMS and provides ongoing statutory support for the vision and principles of the CWMS. The Proposed Land and Water Regional Plan (LWRP) is now operative and sets outcomes

and limits for water quality for urban and rural water bodies. These outcomes and limits can be adjusted at the local level as sub-regional chapters are added.

- 17 A change to the LWRP which revises the regional-level approach to farm nutrient management, and incorporates the Matrix of Good Management, was notified on 13 February 2016.
- 18 Work continues on developing local solution packages with the zone committees and then reflecting the solutions in sub-regional chapters. The table below outlines the current status of all sub-regional processes.

### On-the-ground action: ZIP delivery

- 19 Environment Canterbury has established six zone teams who will prepare and implement work programmes that deliver the zone committees' priorities. Zone managers are working on 2 -5 year work programmes for each zone committee. These teams will work alongside and align with district/city council projects.
- 20 Up to the end of March 2016, \$5.4 million has been approved for 297 projects under the CWMS Immediate Steps Biodiversity programme. In addition, \$800,000 has been spent on regional projects concentrating on the Rakaia/Rangitata headwaters, Wainono Lagoon and fish passage. Restoration and stormwater improvement work continues in urban streams: Lyell Creek (Kaikoura), Riccarton Stream, Addington Brook and Cashmere streams.
- 21 The CWMS Regional Committee has confirmed a set of 11 biodiversity/ecosystem health outcomes (see table below), and recommended that Environment Canterbury and partner agencies (DOC, LINZ, district/city councils, Ngāi Tahu) and others work together toward these outcomes.

### Regional Committee Biodiversity/Ecosystem Health Outcomes By June 2021:

- 1. The protection, maintenance and restoration of Canterbury's braided rivers is supported
- 2. The protection, maintenance and restoration of wetlands is supported

- 5. Management plans for ecologically significant habitats, key sites and corridors are in place

## Draft Triennial Agreement and Mayoral Forum Charter

### Purpose

1 This paper asks you to approve the draft Triennial Agreement 2016-2019 and draft Mayoral Forum Charter of Purpose 2016-2019, for inclusion in the briefing to incoming Mayors.

### Recommendations

That the Canterbury Mayoral Forum:

- 1 **approve** the draft Triennial Agreement 2016-2019 and draft Mayoral Forum Charter of Purpose 2016-2019, for inclusion in the briefing to incoming Mayors following local body elections in October 2016
- 2 **note** that the Chief Executives Forum will report back to the Mayoral Forum on 24 June 2016 with a draft three-year work programme.

### Background

- 2 On 4 December 2015, the Mayoral Forum agreed to develop a briefing to incoming Mayors following local body elections in October 2016, as provided for in section 6 of the Triennial Agreement 2013-2016.
- 3 The Mayoral Forum also agreed to consider a draft triennial agreement and three-year work programme at the April meetings of the Chief Executives Forum and Mayoral Forum.

### Draft Triennial Agreement 2016-2019

- 4 Not later than 1 March following local government elections, local authorities within a region are required to enter into a triennial agreement to fulfil the requirements of Section 15 of the Local Government Act 2002. The purpose of triennial agreements is to ensure appropriate levels of communication and co-ordination between local authorities within the region.
- 5 The Canterbury Triennial Agreement 2013–2016:
  - itemises collaborative commitments for 2013–2016
  - assigns primary responsibility for communication, co-ordination and collaboration to the Mayoral Forum, supported by the Chief Executives Forum and other regional and sub-regional forums as required
  - includes a Charter of Purpose for the Mayoral Forum
  - establishes the Chief Executives Forum.

- 6 The Mayoral Forum has a mandate to operate under the Triennial Agreement, which is ratified by all member councils.
- 7 A draft Triennial Agreement and Mayoral Forum Charter of Purpose are appended. Proposed changes/additions are highlighted in these documents, for your consideration.

### Draft three-year work programme

- 8 On 26 February 2016, the Mayoral Forum endorsed proposals from the Chief Executives Forum to:
  - engage Peter Winder to review progress on collaboration and shared services in this triennium
  - request a working group of Chief Executives to explore further opportunities for collaboration, including structural and institutional arrangements to more effectively govern and manage the delivery of services, infrastructure and regulatory functions across our region.
- 9 On 4 April 2016 the Chief Executives Forum agreed to defer drafting of a three-year work programme until after the Winder report and working group report have been discussed by the Mayoral Forum in April 2016. The Chief Executives Forum will bring a draft threeyear work programme to the Mayoral Forum meeting on 24 June.

### CANTERBURY LOCAL AUTHORITIES TRIENNIAL AGREEMENT

### 1. PURPOSE

Not later than 1 March following triennial local government elections, local authorities within a regional council area are required to enter into a Triennial Agreement (S.15 of the Local Government Act 2002). The purpose of the Triennial Agreement is to ensure appropriate levels of communication, co-ordination and collaboration between local authorities within the region.

The Triennial Agreement is ratified by all member councils.

### 2. AGREEMENT

The parties:

Ashburton District Council Canterbury Regional Council (Environment Canterbury) Christchurch City Council Hurunui District Council Kaikōura District Council Mackenzie District Council Selwyn District Council Timaru District Council Waimakariri District Council Waimate District Council Waitaki District Council

agree to work collaboratively and in good faith for the good governance and success of their districts, cities and the region.

As signatories to this Agreement, each local authority will ensure that pursuant to Section 15, Local Government Act, 2002:

- early notification to affected local authorities party to this Agreement through the distribution
  of draft documentation of major policy initiatives or proposals that may have implications
  beyond the current geographic boundaries (or for constituent authorities) of the decisionmaking authority. This includes the requirement of Section 15 (2) of the Local Government
  Act for consultation on proposals for new regional council activities where the following
  process will be followed.
- any new significant activity, as defined in Section 16 (1) of the Act, proposed by the Canterbury Regional Council, will be advised to the appropriate meeting of the Canterbury Mayoral Forum, in addition to any Section 16 (1) requirement
- any new activity proposed by the Canterbury Regional Council not considered significant will be advised to the appropriate territorial authorities in the Canterbury Region
- the application of a "no surprises" policy where early notice will be given of potential disagreements between, or actions likely to have significant impact on, other local authorities.

### 3. COLLABORATION

The local authorities in Canterbury, as signatories to this Agreement, commit to working collaboratively to drive efficiencies and better provide for the needs of their communities through the provision of good quality local infrastructure, local public services and performance of regulatory functions. This collaboration may either be Canterbury wide or on a sub-regional basis.

Collaborative commitment for the 2016-2019 term will include but is not restricted to:

- an effective Canterbury Mayoral Forum (Charter of Purpose attached)
- developing and voicing a shared vision for Canterbury
- continuing to develop and implement the Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy, and advocating on economic and social development opportunities for Canterbury
- continuing to implement the Canterbury Water Management Strategy (CWMS)
- integrated transport planning for the region
- refreshing and implementing the Urban Development Strategy (UDS) for greater Christchurch
- developing a three-year work programme for the Canterbury Chief Executives Forum, including a framework for collaboration in the governance and management of effective and efficient delivery of services, infrastructure and regulatory functions across the region
- working through the Canterbury Policy Forum to address common strategic policy issues, generating where possible common positions and submissions, and facilitating the coordinated sharing and reporting of information
- implementing a collaborative planning and decision making process including integrated RMA planning
- ensuring effective resilience and response to civil defence and emergency management, and natural hazard risk management.

### 4. CANTERBURY MAYORAL FORUM

Co-ordination, communication and collaboration in relation to this Agreement will be primarily through, but not limited to, the Canterbury Mayoral Forum (the Forum). The Forum will meet at least three-monthly and operate in accordance with its agreed Charter of Purpose (attached).

The Forum will be supported by:

- the Chief Executives Forum
- the Canterbury Policy Forum
- other regional and sub-regional forums and working groups as required.

### 5. CHIEF EXECUTIVES FORUM

There will be a Chief Executives Forum reporting to the Canterbury Mayoral Forum, which will develop a three-year work programme that:

- implements and manages collaborative projects and agreed actions of the Canterbury Mayoral Forum
- identifies and escalates strategic issues and opportunities for collaboration on strategy, policy and planning from the Canterbury Policy Forum to the Canterbury Mayoral Forum

 includes a framework for collaboration in the governance and management of effective and efficient delivery of services, infrastructure and regulatory functions across the region.

### 6. REVIEW AND AGREEMENT TO REVIEW

The parties to the Triennial Agreement will meet to consider and agree on progress on and to amendments, if any, to the agreement annually before the end of each calendar year. In addition, following a request for amendment from any one or more authorities party to this agreement in writing to the Chair of the Forum, received at least two weeks prior to the meeting date, the Forum will meet to consider the amendment at the next available Forum meeting.

This Agreement will be placed on the Forum agenda at the final Forum prior to a triennial election to review, with the purpose of recommending changes (if any) to the incoming councils.

### 7. LOCAL GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE

Notwithstanding the spirit of co-operation and collaboration embodied within this Agreement, the local authorities, individually or collectively, reserve the right to promote, consult, and/or research change to the structure of local government within the Region.

This right is consistent with the intent of effective and efficient governance sought in the Local Government Act 2002, having particular relevance to the ideals of interest and community representation.

Local authorities will participate in the review of the regional council's representation arrangements, as required under statute, and the Mayoral Forum will also participate in the review providing the Forum's views.

### 8. OTHER AGREEMENTS

This Agreement does not prevent local authorities entering into other agreements among themselves or outside the region to facilitate their responsibilities. Any other such agreement should not be contrary to the purpose and spirit of this Agreement.

### 9. REGIONAL POLICY STATEMENT REVIEW

This Triennial Agreement will apply to any change, variation or review of the Canterbury Regional Policy Statement.

### CANTERBURY MAYORAL FORUM

### CHARTER OF PURPOSE 2016–2019

### 1. NAME

The name of the group shall be the Canterbury Mayoral Forum.

### 2. OBJECTIVES

- (a) To provide a forum to enable Canterbury councils to work more collaboratively with each other and with central government and other key sector leaders in Canterbury to identify opportunities and solve problems together.
- (b) To identify and prioritise issues of mutual concern and foster co-operation, coordination and collaboration to address these issues (including where appropriate joint work plans).
- (c) To formulate policies and strategies on matters where all member councils may act collaboratively in determining plans for the co-ordination of regional growth.
- (d) To ensure increased effectiveness of local government in meeting the needs of Canterbury communities.
- (e) To act as an advocate to central government or their agencies or other bodies on issues of concern to members.
- (f) To develop and implement programmes, which are responsive to the needs and expectations of the community.

### 3. PRINCIPLES

In pursuit of these objectives the Canterbury Mayoral Forum will observe the following principles:

- (a) Establish and maintain close liaison with other local government networks to ensure as far as possible the pursuit of common objectives and the minimisation of duplication.
- (b) Establish and maintain close liaison with Ministers of the Crown and local Members of Parliament.
- (c) Establish and maintain close liaison with a wide number of diverse stakeholders and key sector organisations within the region.
- (d) Exercise its functions with due regard to the tangata whenua and cultural diversity of the Canterbury community.
- (e) Keep the local community informed about its activities.
- (f) Encourage member councils to promote and apply cross-boundary structures and systems.

(g) Establish a provision for reporting back to its respective Councils.

### 4. POWERS

- (a) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum shall have the power to:
  - (i) Levy for any or all of its objects in such amount or amounts as may be mutually determined and acceptable to individual local authorities.
  - (ii) determine and make payments from its funds for any or all of the purposes of its objects.
  - (ii) Receive any grant or subsidy and apply monies for the purposes of such grant or subsidy.
  - (iv) Fund appropriate aspects of the Forum's activities regionally.
- (b) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum does not have the power to legally bind any council to any act or decision unless that act or decision has been agreed to by decision of that council.

### 5. MEMBERSHIP

(a) Membership of the Canterbury Mayoral Forum shall be open to the following councils.

Ashburton District Council Canterbury Regional Council (Environment Canterbury) Christchurch City Council Hurunui District Council Kaikōura District Council Mackenzie District Council Selwyn District Council Timaru District Council Waimakariri District Council Waimate District Council Waitaki District Council

- (b) Each member council shall be represented by its Mayor (or Chairperson in the case of Environment Canterbury) and supported by its Chief Executive. On occasions where the Mayor or Chair cannot attend, [a] council may be represented by its Deputy Mayor or Chair.
- (c) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum will have the power to co-opt other members on a permanent and/or issues basis.

### 6. CHAIRPERSON

(a) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum shall appoint a Chairperson at the first meeting immediately following the Triennial Elections. This appointment may be reviewed after a period of 18 months.

- (b) The Chairperson elected will preside at all meetings of the Canterbury Mayoral Forum.
- (c) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum shall elect a Deputy Chairperson at the first meeting immediately following the Triennial Elections.
- (d) The Canterbury Mayoral Forum may appoint spokespersons from its membership for issues being considered.

### 7. MEETINGS

- (a) Meetings will be held as required with an annual schedule, covering a calendar year, to be determined by the members. It is anticipated that meetings would be held three-monthly at venues to be determined.
- (b) Special meetings may be called at the request of four Mayors/Chairpersons.
- (c) A working group of Chief Executives will facilitate preparation of material for consideration by the Canterbury Mayoral Forum.
- (d) Agendas for meetings will be issued and minutes will be taken and circulated.

### 8. DECISION MAKING

The practice of the Forum will be to determine issues before it by consensus. If the consensus is to determine issues by voting, the determination shall be determined by a majority of votes of the authorities represented at the meeting through the Mayor (or Chair) or their nominated representative.

### 9. SECRETARIAT

The Canterbury Mayoral Forum will appoint Environment Canterbury to carry out the secretariat function on such terms and conditions as it shall decide for the discharge of duties, including the taking of minutes and the keeping of any books and accounts and attending to any other business of the forum.
